For paper 2, question 5 you will be assessed on:

A05: Communicate clearly, effectively and imaginatively, selecting and adapting tone, style and register for different forms, purposes and audiences. Organise information and ideas, using structural and grammatical features to support coherence and cohesion of texts

AO6: Candidates must use a range of vocabulary and sentence structures for clarity, purpose and effect, with accurate spelling and punctuation. (This requirement must constitute 20% of the marks for each specification as a whole.)

What do I need to do for Paper 2, Question 5?

This question asks you to produce a piece of **opinion writing**, expressing your point of view on a subject or idea, in a particular **form.**

- You could be asked to explain, instruct, advise, argue or persuade in the question.
- You may be asked to write a **letter**, **article**, **text for a leaflet**, **text of a speech or an essay** and you need to follow the conventions and style of the text type in the question.
- You have **45 minutes** to plan and answer this question.
- There are **40 marks** for this answer:

24 marks for content and organisation 16 marks for technical accuracy.

To answer his question you need to remember the ICDAFOREST techniques, these are outlined on the next page.

Remember to use ICDAFOREST techniques in your response!

- I- Imperative. E.g. 'give', 'don't', 'go', 'get'.
- C- Connectives E.g. 'however', 'therefore', 'alternatively'.
- D- Direct Address E.g. 'you', 'us', 'we'.
- A- Alliteration/ Anecdotes E.g. 'wild weather'/ 'When I was younger...'
- F- Facts E.g. 'Plants produce oxygen'
- O- Opinions E.g. 'I think animal testing is wrong'
- R- Rhetorical Question E.g. 'Will you do something about it?'
- E- Emotive Language E.g. 'Innocent children are starving'.
- S- Statistics E.g. '90% of young people have an online presence.'
- T- Three (rule of) E.g. 'It is cruel, unjust and unfair.'
